

PENNSYLVANIA

Voters in the Keystone State will elect a new attorney general and state treasurer in 2024. All 203 seats in the state house as well as 25 of 50 state senate seats will also be on the ballot in November. Legislative chambers as well as the executive offices are considered toss-ups.

Erin McClelland

Erin McClelland spent 15 years as a substance abuse and mental health counselor before serving in other roles within treatment research, organization, and planning, including government services. In 2014 and 2016, McClelland ran unsuccessfully for a U.S. House seat in Pennsylvania's 12th District. Since 2015, she has performed process improvement and policy work for the Allegheny County Department of Human Services.

She is focused on rebuilding **Pennsylvania's supply chain**: McClelland plans to enforce contract oversight authority to ensure compliance with all trade regulations and laws while keeping the state legislature informed of all applicable standards. She <u>supports</u> requiring companies in Pennsylvania to verify their supply chains are free of goods from countries with records of human rights abuses and denying state contracts if the companies cannot show they have cut ties with these countries.

Strong opposition to <u>privatized options for public-sector **pensions**</u> and non-employer sponsored retirement accounts in the private sector are a tenet of McClelland's campaign, particularly the potential **Keystone Saves accounts** that are under consideration in the state senate. If elected, McClelland plans to provide <u>rigorous oversight</u> of these types of financial products.

McClelland <u>has promised</u> to halt investment of Pennsylvania's money into **foreign buildings** and to instead invest in the cybersecurity of the treasurer's office.

Trivia: In 2006, she launched Pennsylvania's first orthomolecular recovery program for addiction.
