Voters in Indiana will elect a governor and attorney general this cycle. All 100 house seats are on the ballot as well as 25 out of the 50 senate seats. Republicans are expected to maintain their Republican trifecta, controlling the office of governor and both chambers of the state legislature.

Republican Nominee

Attorney General Todd Rokita

Attorney General Todd Rokita (R) is looking to secure a second term in office this November after running unopposed at the Republican Convention held in June. Prior to his time in the Attorney General Office, Rokita served as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives from 2011 to 2019. He also served two terms as Indiana Secretary of State from 2002 to 2010.

Rokita's campaign is highlighting accomplishments from his long history in Indiana politics while also promoting <u>several issues</u> of focus for him as the state's chief legal officer. Those issues include bolstering **public safety**, strengthening the **economy**, stopping unwanted **robocalls**, advancing parents' rights, and supporting the **second amendment**.

Rokita is <u>touting</u> several successes from his first term such as returning **\$81 million-plus in** unclaimed property in one year and over **\$1 billion in legal settlement for taxpayers over** three years. He has frequently referred to his creation of a **Parents Bill of Rights** during his tenure.

In June, Rokita was endorsed by former President Donald Trump in a post on social media platform Truth Social. Rokita is well funded and carries name recognition both at the state and national level. At the end of June, his campaign had <u>raised</u> \$483,00 during the reporting period, with \$1.3 million cash on hand going into the Summer. His Democratic opponent Destiny Wells had just \$97,000 cash on hand.

Sabato's Crystal Ball rated this race as leans Republican, a shift from safe Republican.

Trivia: When Rokita was elected to office in 2002 at 32 years old, he became the youngest secretary of state in the United States at that time.
